It takes a village to raise a child

Child Care Spaces ~ There are 175 licensed child care centres in Kamloops with space for 2752 children.

Average monthly parent fees in 2009:

\$928 for infant care \$824 for toddler care \$675 for 3-5 year olds These are all ↑ from 2008

Although there are more **spaces available** due to government stimulus, waitlists continue to grow due to vacancies for qualified staff.

Full day Kindergarten will support emergent literacy, language development, creativity and social interaction for all five year olds over the next two years. These are all critical skills for grade 1 and beyond.



Nutritious food is a prerequisite for good health

The Kamloops **Food Bank** hands out **1.5 million pounds** of food each year.

In June of 2010—**8%** of the clients served by the Food Bank were children **under the age of 6**.

According to the **Dieticians of Canada**, **\$835** is the average monthly cost for a **nutritious food basket** for a family of **four** living in the Interior Health Region.

The Boys and Girls
Club of Kamloops uses:
12 fridges of fruit
84 loaves of bread
& 208 litres of milk
every month to feed the
children and youth in their
programs. For some
children, these are the first
meals of their day.

Grocery costs for the club are over **\$8000 each** month.



Children need stable home environments to thrive

In **2006** there were **7135** children **0-6** years old in the **Kamloops/ Thompson** region.

The Low Income Cut Off (LICO) for Kamloops in **2006 was \$33,046.** Census data (2006) shows **16% of families** in Kamloops living on family incomes **below \$30,000.**

Unemployment rates for families with 0-6 year olds is **8.3%.**

The **average house price** in Kamloops in 2008 was **\$379,000** which has **more than doubled** in the last 4 years.

There was a **0.7% vacancy rate** in 2008 with one-bedroom **rental fees rising** from \$565 in 2006 to \$618 in 2007.

BC has had the highest rate of **child poverty** in Canada for the last **7 years**.



The first 6 years set the stage for healthy living for life

There were **976 babies** born to families living in Kamloops in 2009 ↑ from **920** in 2008.

5.5% of babies born at RIH in 2009 weighed less than 2500g and considered low birth weight - similar to the IHA region rate of 5.4%.
The provincial goal is 4%

Since 2009 **all newborns** have the opportunity to have their **hearing screened** to detect early hearing loss.

77% of children born to families living in Kamloops are fully immunized at age 2—this is higher than the IHA region rate of 68.9%.

In 2009—82% of Kamloops mothers were **exclusively breastfeeding their infants** after birth and 39% after 6 months.



My ability to learn starts at birth

In 2009—**933** little ones participated in **Parent-Child Mother Goose** programs in Kamloops.

There are **3 Strong Start** Early Learning
Centres in Kamloops
located at:

Arthur Hatton
Marion Shilling &
South Sa-Hali
Elementary Schools—

these are **free** drop-in programs for children up to **5** with their caregivers.

Early Development Instrument (EDI) ~

The EDI measures **5 domains** of development for all children in kindergarten.

28.1% of children in School District 73 were vulnerable on at least one scale of development in 2009 - an **increase of almost 6%** since 2006.

Parents report the following **3** issues as limiting to children's participation in community activities: inconvenient program times, too costly, not enough family time.



My environment can help me grow and develop

The Kamloops **Children's Charter of Rights** will be launched on International Children's Day—**Nov 20th, 2010.** This community Charter will **increase awareness** about children's rights and help keep our children in the forefront of our minds when making community decisions.

In partnership with **Success by 6**, Make Children First launched a new Business Strategy to promote the importance of **investing in families** with young children. Not only will our community benefit through greater economic prosperity, but families will be better supported to achieve more **balanced work-family lives**.
